Our Workshop Presenters on November 6th



MTNA President Karen Thickstun, NCTM, teaches piano pedagogy at Butler University, directs the Butler Community Arts School and maintains an independent studio. Thickstun holds degrees in piano performance/economics from Duke University, business administration from University of Virginia and piano pedagogy from Butler University. Three of her pedagogy students have received MTNA's Mary Sue Harris Studio Fellowship award. She advises the Butler MTNA Collegiate Chapter, which has presented at state and national conferences.

Thickstun served as MTNA Secretary-Treasurer from 2013–2015 and MTNA Vice President from 2015–2017. Recent national appointments include membership committee chair, grants and awards task force chair, MTNA Teacher of the Year committee chair and strategic planning committee. She served as director of East Central Division from 2008–2010, chairing the Local Associations Forum.

Thickstun authors a tri-annual column, "It's All Your Business," for American Music Teacher. Karen's articles have also appeared in Keyboard Companion and Clavier Companion. She has presented business and pedagogy sessions at MTNA National Conferences, National Conference for Keyboard Pedagogy and state/local conferences. Thickstun has been active in Indiana MTA as state president, trustee chair, and various state and local positions. She received the Distinguished Service Award in 2002 and the Teacher of the Year award in 2008.

As founding director of the Butler Community Arts School, Thickstun provides leadership and vision. Serving more than 2,000 children through private lessons, group classes and camps, instruction is provided by more than 100 Butler University students that she mentors in professional teaching practices. Working with afterschool programs, community centers and United Way agencies, Thickstun has developed a network of community partners to provide access to the arts for inner-city youth. To fund outreach classes and need-based scholarships, Thickstun has written and received grants for more than \$100,000 annually for the past eight years.

Dr. Fred Karpoff presents workshops and masterclasses throughout North America and abroad, including appearances at the past several MTNA Conferences, the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy, and the East-West Asia Conference. He is regularly featured as the conference artist and/or clinician at state and provincial music teachers' association events, including those of Texas, California, Oregon, Oklahoma, Kansas, Connecticut, New York, Pennsylvania, Utah, Alabama, Alberta, and North and South Carolina.

A former Artistic Ambassador for the United States Information Agency, Karpoff is a prize winner in the San Antonio, Dublin, and Competition Internationale international piano competitions. As a guest artist at music festivals in the U.S. and Europe, he has collaborated with many of America's foremost musicians. In addition to his critically acclaimed CD release, *Heroic Tales: Piano Music of Edward McDowell, Renegade* Classics issued his

live Beethoven Trio performances with musicians at the Skaneateles Festival and *This Moment* and *Snapshots* with soprano Rebecca Karpoff.

He has performed as a soloist and collaborative pianist on four continents, including venues in Germany, France, Luxembourg, Belgium, Ghana, Zimbabwe, Ireland, Finland, Italy, China, India, and North America. He has been fortunate to study with Leon Fleisher, Ann Schein, Robert Weirich and Yoheved Kaplinsky, and to have had extensive coachings with Karl Ulrich Schnabel and Richard Goode. He holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the Peabody Conservatory and his undergraduate training took place at Northwestern University.

Fred Karpoff has served as visiting professor at the Eastman School of Music and is an international Steinway Artist. He guides teachers and students toward more efficient, healthful, and expressive piano playing as founder and Artistic Producer of Entrada Piano at entradapiano.com. He is Professor of Piano and Ensemble Arts at the Setnor School of Music at Syracuse University, which has honored him with the Excellence in Graduate Education Faculty Recognition Award. His education includes a M.M. and D.M.A. from Peabody Conservatory of The John Hopkins University and a B.M. from Northwestern University.

Fred's Workshop


Title: Practice Pointers for Perplexing Passages -- Plus Effortless Trills and Tremolos

Dr. Fred Karpoff will share multiple practice strategies for solving repertoire conundrums, drawing upon passages recently submitted by piano teachers that pose problems for their students or themselves. Teachers requested "tips and drills" for playing these spots confidently and accurately, redistributing awkward passages, and memorizing effectively, and the featured repertoire includes fast chromatic scales, jumps, pedaling issues, legato fingering for smaller hands, trills, double trills, and more. We will provide a PDF of the examples via the website, so that you may follow the scores while Fred demonstrates solutions for us. Additionally, Fred will amplify his presentation with a segments of his session, *Effortless Trills and Tremolos*.

Congratulations to **Candace Cleary, Melissa Dvorak, Francesca Hurst,** and **Megan Stuart**, who became nationally certified during the past year.

Several other Virginia teachers are midway in the process, and I hope many of you, both independent music teachers and college faculty members, will decide this is the year to go for it. I am certain you will be glad you did.

With 80 teachers certified at this time (13.8% of our state membership), Virginia ranks 34th nationally. In the highest-ranking state, New Hampshire, one-third of the membership is nationally certified. That could be a goal for us in Virginia, too, but the main goal for each of us is a personal one -- professional excellence.

The letters NCTM show the world outside VMTA that we music teachers are <u>professionals</u>, just as doctors and lawyers are professionals --- that we aspire to and maintain high standards for ourselves in our teaching and that we are committed to lifelong learning.

Our VMTA Member Workshop Presenters



Christy Tallamy, NCTM of Little Ears Music Studio (LEMS) in Loudoun County, Virginia. LEMS offers both private music education and music publishing services. She is the founder and editor of Conversations at the Piano Bench, an annual student-driven composition collection. Prior to opening her studio, she worked as a marketing and public relations officer for a Small Business Development firm. She went on to work as a marketer and writer in a Maryland-based Publishing House. She received her BA in Communications and Marketing from Lee University.

Title of Presentation: "Conceive, Create, Complete: Shaping Musical Minds through Composition"

Composition engages the complete musical mind-- promoting critical and creative thinking. It is a bridge between learning music and understanding music. Yet we often view composition as an extra or even advanced skill-- one we don't have time to teach. In this presentation, you will learn how to mentor your students in developing basic composition skills, how to efficiently incorporate composition into your regular lessons, and how to inspire students to conceive, create and complete their musical skills.



Dr. Eric Ruple, Pianist and Steinway Artist, is Professor of Piano at James Madison University (Virginia, USA). He received his doctoral degree in Piano Performance from the University of Michigan, with additional degrees from The University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, and Arizona State University. He is a nationally certified music teacher, and enjoys an active career as a soloist, chamber musician, and teacher. Performances include several solo concerts at Steinway Hall in New York, and at the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C., including a performance of Beethoven's "Diabelli" Variations. He has also performed at several American Liszt Society conferences (most recently in fall of 2018), as well as other performances throughout the United States. He was a featured guest, with Ian Zook, at the 2014 International Horn Symposium, and he and Mr. Zook released a CD of 20th century horn/piano sonatas under the "MSR Classics" label. Recent solo programs have featured either the music of Beethoven, Liszt, or 20th

century piano music. He has been a guest adjudicator in both Hong Kong and the Philippines.

As keyboard player with the Virginia Symphony Orchestra, he has been a part of many and varied performances, from harpsichord in Vivaldi's "Four Seasons" to featured piano soloist in Bernstein's "Prelude, Fugue and Riffs", to harmonium in the VSO's recording of Mahler Symphony #8, and most recently, he has been principal synthesizer soloist in the ongoing "Harry Potter in Concert" series.

Dr. Ruple served as Interim Director of the School of Music at James Madison University from 2019-2020.

Title of Presentation: "The Big Move: Transitioning High School Music Students to the University"

This workshop is an opportunity to hear about the opportunities for high school music students to continue music studies in the college or university of their choice. Dr. Ruple believes that even today, especially today, being a music major in college is one of the "sneaky-best" choices a student can make for their college career. The world is changing fast, job opportunities are changing fast, but the skills developed in music study are among the most critically important for success in the new world we live in, whatever one's final career path will be. Whether your students intend to become a music major or not, aspire to being a professional musician or not, there are a multitude of ways to stay connected to musical experiences and education.



Dr. Wanchi studied both piano and violin in her native Taiwan. Though she won several youth piano competitions as a child, she eventually opted in favor of violin "because I could take the violin anywhere I wanted." She chose well, earning admission to the prestigious Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia. Her violin teachers in this country included Daniel Heifetz, Shirley Givens, Jaime Laredo, Jascha Brosdky, Dorothy Delay and Naoko Tanaka. Wanchi currently serves as Full Professor of Violin at JMU and also as a concertmaster of the Waynesboro Symphony.

Her CD recordings of the Sonatas of Eugène Ysaÿe, and complete Partitas and Sonatas of J.S. Bach for unaccompanied violin, both on the Centaur Records label, have been excellently reviewed ("... her incisive technique and an exceptionally rich and beautiful tone. . ." by Phil's Classical Reviews, Audio Video Club of Atlanta).

She is an active solo and chamber music performer at venues including Kennedy Center, Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center Curtis on Tour, and

numerous festivals in the world. Her fourth CD on the Centaur label, which presents music by William Walton and Benjamin Britten in a collaboration with longtime friend and pianist Robert Koenig, was released in May 2019. She serves as Concertmaster for the Waynesboro Symphony Orchestra since 2014. Wanchi plays a modern American violin made by Feng Jiang of the Greg Alf studio in Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Title of Presentation: "Practice effectively using limited resources for Beginning, Intermediate and Advanced level Students and Ourselves"

When there is a shortage of time or monetary means for our students to purchase a wide variety of etudes and scales books, I find it imperative to invent new methods using the only resource they have. This resource could be one Xerox copy of an orchestra excerpt that was handed out by their orchestra director, a Suzuki book, a movement or a concerto printed out from IMSLP.ORG

Over the years, I find that I have had to improvise new methods right on the spot, such as creating a variety of rhythmic, harmonic and melodic patterns based on isolated sections straight from that very piece of music in front of them. Different types of challenges may have included shifting, rhythm, and intonation. Methods will be explored and demonstrated in the presentation using limited resources. Repertoire excerpts from three different skill levels will be discussed.



Andreas and Zhu Duo have been performing together since 2015. They were invited to perform nationwide including at the Duke University in 2015 and the Annual Convention of the National Flute Association in 2019 and 2021. Their new CD album "Beyond Bossa—Brazilian Romantic Works for Flute and Piano" will be soon released by Orpheus Classical with its full endorsement and support.

Brazilian flutist **Guilherme Andreas** received First Place in the 2020 International Music Competition "Paris and London" Grand Prize Virtuoso and 2019 Concert Artists International Virtuoso Competition's professional division. Andreas was recently named Principal Flute of Symphony Number One in Baltimore for the 2018/2019 season and is also a Teaching Artist with Education Through Music in NYC. He was also recently appointed as a Trevor James Alto Flutes Artist, selected to be a member of the 2019 Global Leaders Program, and awarded the Sphinx Connect 2019 and 2020 Fellowship and SOPA 2020. Andreas has also been back at performing in New York City and has recently appointed Adjunct Professor with University at Albany teaching Music Theory through a partnership with New Visions for Public Schools in NYC.

Pianist **Gianne Zhu** has given intensive solo and collaborative performances in the USA, China, Germany, Italy, and Malta, as well as in participating in competitions. Her recent solo accomplishments include winning the 2019 Washington International Piano Festival and playing at the Kennedy Center. She was also a finalist of the 1st Brescia International Piano Competition in Italy. In addition, she won the third prize at the 2016 West Virginia International Piano Competition and played Chopin E-minor Concerto with the JMU Symphony Orchestra after she won the 2016 JMU Concerto/Aria Competition. Ms. Zhu also has a passion for advocating new music: Her lecture-recital focused on two piano solo works by American composer Augusta Read Thomas. The performance was highly praised by the composer and featured on her website. Her completed dissertation was on the same topic with a concentration on exploring the unpredictability in these two sets. Currently Ms. Zhu serves as the state music theory chair of VMTA and is a private instructor teaching in Northern Virginia and South Maryland. Ms. Zhu holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Peabody Conservatory, and she is completing her doctorate at James Madison University.

Title of the Presentation: The Colorful Sound of Brazilian Romantic Music for Flute and Piano – Exploring Standard and Newly Uncovered Repertoire

The goal of the presentation is to introduce standard and newly uncovered repertoire by Brazilian classical composers. We will be performing selected romantic works by Villa-Lobos, Miguez, and other Brazilian classical composers. Before performing each piece, we will explain the background of these compositions and the challenges that performers may face when playing these pieces. When talking about Brazilian music, Bossa Nova and Samba may be the only two styles that come up to one's mind, and Heitor Villa-Lobos was probably the only Brazilian classical composer who was well known to the world. However, Brazilian music, especially its classical music, contains much broader content.

Between 1882-1894, several Brazilian composers received financial support to study in Europe. Some studied in the Paris Conservatory and in Europe, were able learn from musical personalities of the time. Back in Brazil, composers such as Leopoldo Miguez, became a great promoter of the then called "music of the future", mainly preconized by Wagner's followers.

At the time, Brazilian composers visited conservatories in France, Belgium, Germany, and Italy, collecting suggestions for the improvement of music teaching in Brazil. Meanwhile very important works came to life such as the Sonata Op. 14 for Flute and Piano (transcription), which is very similar to works by Frank, Faure, Brahms, Chopin and Wagner. We believe that these works should not be only known by the audiences in Brazil, but also across the globe.

JOHN WINN is a composer and musician living in Richmond, Virginia. A former student of Allan Blank and Doug Richards at VCU, he received his Master of Music degree in Composition in 1995. Mr. Winn has composed music for independent film, for jazz ensemble, Shakespeare plays and various chamber music configurations. Speculum Musicae clarinetist and Columbia University professor Allen Blustine programmed John's solo clarinet piece "Running, Skipping, Jumping" in concerts for children in the mid-1990s.

John has written incidental music as well as original music for the songs in two Shakespeare productions - *The Tempest* (Sonnet Repertory Theatre, NYC) and *As You Like It* (Cornell University). Mr. Winn's string quartet *The More Things Change...* was commissioned in 2009 for the Oberon String Quartet and was premiered by that ensemble in Richmond. It was also programmed in 2016 as part of the summer chamber music festival *Loon Lake Live!* (Loon Lake/Saranac Lake, NY).

In 2005 Loon Lake Live! released a CD of John's music which included his Adirondack Suite for strings, harp and clarinet as well as his song cycle, Songs For Modern Times for string quartet and voice. In 2011 Mr. Winn composed a suite for jazz band to celebrate the 100th anniversary of St. Christopher's School. The piece, titled Centennial Suite, was performed by the school's student jazz band that year.

Mr. Winn also works as an arranger, recently arranging music for the Virginia Repertory Theatre production of *Ella and her fella Frank*. He also orchestrated Susan Greenbaum's song "This Life" for her 2019 concert performance with the Richmond Symphony Orchestra. His arrangements of three George Gershwin songs were just played in an October 2021 performance of the *Violins of Hope* series of concerts that featured members of the Richmond Symphony.

Mr. Winn also maintains an active career as a performer having taken the stage at the Kennedy Center's Terrace Theater and Millennium Stage in Washington, DC many times and has performed and taught across the world in countries as diverse as Cambodia, Russia, South Korea, Mexico and Turkey. John has been on the music faculties at VCU, University of Richmond, Longwood University and Virginia Union University. He currently teaches music at St. Christopher's School in Richmond.



HOPE ARMSTRONG ERB will tell you her favorite music is whatever she is playing right now. As pianist and conductor, she has performed in North America, Europe, Asia, and Africa in a wide range of genres – vocal and instrumental chamber music, solo piano, choral and orchestral masterworks, opera, musical theater, jazz, folk, world music, and new music premieres. Proclaimed "a wonder in her ability to maintain a high standard in both performance and teaching" she has taught in public and private schools K-12 and at VCU and University of Richmond. Currently she offers private instruction in piano, theory, and composition, and coaches and accompanies professional and student instrumentalists and vocalists. Hope is chair of the VMTA commissioned composer program and is delighted to premiere John Winn's four movement *Modalities* for solo piano.



History of the Beginning of the Virginia Music Teachers Association



Donald Bolger

The Virginia Music Teachers Association (VMTA) was founded in 1964 and the first meeting was held on November 1, 1963. It was the 44th state chapter to be founded for MTNA. The first President was Donald Bolger who was a faculty member at Hollins College. He received his education from the Eastman School of Music, Rochester, NY. He held a Bachelor of Music and Master of Music degrees. He remained the President until 1969.

The first three chapters were set in Martinsville (Henry County), Norfolk, and Roanoke in this order. According to the Roanoke World News, (Thursday, November 2, 1965) the first state conference (convention) was held November 28-30, 1965 at the Hotel Jefferson in Richmond. Miss Polly Gibbs presided over the convention as the Southern Division President of MTNA and who was a speaker at the event. She discussed "A Look at Our Profession". At this convention, a plan of teacher certification was adopted.

Miss Anne McClenny of Hollins College was chairman of the Teacher Certification Plan. Miss Joan Curnutt of Longwood College was named Chairman of a proposed Student Activities Program. George Luntz of Mary Washington College, was the first Vice President. Mrs. J. Montague Holland of Richmond was named Second Vice President. Neel B. Clark of Fredericksburg was named the Secretary and Mrs. Henry C. Charlton was the Treasurer. The convention pianist was Roy Hamlin Johnson, Associate Professor of piano at the University of Maryland. He opened the convention with a recital and gave several lectures on piano teaching.

At the convention, President Donald Bolger said, "I can assure you the convention activities will be of great interest to all music teachers. There, we may renew our minds with fresh ideas to educate the students who we influence; we may be inspired to do a better job of teaching; we may enjoy fellowship with friends old and new; and find within ourselves a new zeal to carry on the work of VMTA."

An ad for VMTA that today would be a mission statement said:

"It is the goal of V.M.T.A. to provide the highest standards of musical instruction for students of all levels of advancement, beginner through college."

The first All-State Auditions were at Longwood College and held on February 6, 1966. The auditions were open to High School and College students representing the areas of Piano, Organ, Strings, Voice, and Orchestral instruments. The winners would be one HS and one College winner (with an alternate) who would represent Virginia in the MTNA Divisional Auditions in Atlanta (March 27-30, 1966). Repertoire was two memorized compositions. The second President (1969) was Dr. F. Donald Truesdell, head of the music department at the College of William and Mary. He held degrees from the University of Michigan and the Eastman School of Music.
